Organizational History

The World Institute on Disability (WID) is a non-profit public policy, research and training center dedicated to independence for all people with disabilities. WID was founded in 1983 through the efforts of Ed Roberts, Judy Heumann, and Joan Leon, longtime disability rights activists. Roberts, Heumann and Leon saw a critical need to create awareness and policy change by producing accurate information about people with disabilities, their capabilities, and their assistance needs. WID is funded by a combination of government, foundation, corporate grants and contracts, and individual donations.

Roberts, who was quadriplegic and used a respirator from childhood polio, was the first significantly disabled person to attend the University of California, Berkeley. He and a group of other disabled students helped start the Center for Independent Living (CIL) in Berkeley. He went on to become Director of the California State Department of Rehabilitation, receiving a prestigious MacArthur Foundation "genius" award in 1985. He was the first President of WID and served as President until his death in 1995.

Heumann, a quadriplegic as a result of childhood polio, began her career as an advocate for disability rights when she sued the New York City Board of Education for the right to teach in a school system that considered her "a fire hazard." She won the suit and went on to help start New York's Disabled in Action (DIA). In the 1970s she went West to the Center for Independent Living. In 1993 Heumann left WID to accept an appointment as Assistant Secretary at the Office of Special Education and Research Services at the United States Department of Education.

Leon joined CIL as a volunteer proposal writer, and eventually became their chief development officer. Her skills at program design, strategy and fundraising were instrumental in launching WID. She was the organization's Vice President of Operations and Development for fourteen years.

The Board of Directors and staff, over half of whom are people with disabilities, are respected national leaders in the disability field as well as in industry, government and social services. As a result, WID has been able to bring a diverse disability perspective to the policy arena.

The changes in WID's internal organization over the years reflect the grants and programs of the time.

Since 1984, WID has pioneered research on the use of Personal Assistance Services (PAS). The federally-funded Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Personal Assistance Services (RRTC-PAS), funded in 1993, examines how PAS can promote the economic self-sufficiency, independent living and full integration of people with disabilities into society. The RRTC-PAS also researches the use of PAS in the workplace, abuse by personal assistance providers and the need for a larger, more qualified, workforce of personal assistants.

WID's Technology Policy Division pursues a host of strategies aimed at ensuring greater access to telecommunications and electronic and information technologies for people with disabilities. This division has pioneered the field of technology policy as applied to independent living, and disability rights. WID participates in policy making at the state and federal level, advises key industry sectors and educates consumers about the principles and practices of universal design, at the blue print stage of product development and throughout the product cycle.

The Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Public Policy in Independent Living (RRTC-PPIL) was created in 1989 with a grant from the National Institute on Disability Rehabilitation and Research (NIDRR). A new grant in 1995 changed the name to the Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Independent Living and Disability Policy (RRTC-ILDP). Both centers studied and disseminated information about policy issues that have an impact on independent living. The RRTC-PPIL studied personal assistance services, independent living legislation, leadership and empowerment and community assessment and change. The RRTC-PAS grew out of the focus of the PPIL on PAS. The RRTC-ILDP had five primary objectives: 1) to demonstrate and facilitate collaborations between Centers for Independent Living and other community groups in reforming and implementing public policies that respond to the needs of people with disabilities; 2) to strengthen the ability of CIL's, communities, and vocational rehabilitation agencies to increase successful employment outcomes for people with disabilities; 3) to identify and develop training and research strategies that can be used by CIL's and other groups to improve the accessibility of generic and community services for individuals with significant disabilities; 4) to disseminate the products of its research and analysis in the most appropriate and accessible media to a wide audience; and 5) to demonstrate and evaluate a research and training process based on the Participatory Action Research approach, using Independent Living principles.

The HIV/AIDS and Disability Division, 1991-1998, conducted training on reasonable accommodations, vocational rehabilitation, legal issues, and AIDS education to employers, AIDS service providers and other interested groups. They provided education regarding HIV/AIDS as a disability and technical assistance with developing policies and procedures on HIV/AIDS.

Judy Heumann was originally the Director of Domestic and International Policy at WID. When she left WID, Domestic Policy was dispersed among different divisions within WID, and the International Division was created. It serves as a center for the international exchange of information and expertise on disability and disability policy. WID's international activities include training, technical assistance, needs assessments, program development and evaluation, legislative and policy development, exchange programs, research, conferences, materials development, and international resources and referral. WID's research on Health Policy seeks to expand the accessibility, availability, array and consumer-defined quality of health and long term services in the United States to optimize the physical, mental and emotional well-being of people with disabilities. In addition to addressing physical access, Health Access and Long Term Services (HALTS) promotes cultural competency among health care providers so that patients with disabilities will be better served.

Scope and Content of Collection

The records of the World Institute on Disability, 1983-[ongoing], provide a fairly complete picture of its history since its founding in 1983. The records include founding documents, meeting records, correspondence, reports, research and publications, grant applications, training materials, and promotional materials. Notably absent are the papers of the founding president Edward V. Roberts. Roberts's papers are arranged separately as the Edward V. Roberts Papers (BANC MSS 99/34 cz).

The heart of the collection is in the series that document the research and advocacy functions of WID. WID staff have been particularly active on a national level in the areas of domestic disability policy, personal assistance services and access to technology and telecommunications. Many WID staff members have been appointed to presidential task forces and national committees on a variety of issues including the National Information Infrastructure and President Clinton's Health Care Reform Task Force. WID staff have been prominently involved in local efforts to improve accessibility of services such as the Alameda County Transit System and the Bay Area Rapid Transit System (BART), and they have served on numerous local task forces and advisory boards dealing with issues of importance to disabled persons and of value to society in general.

The collection has been arranged into twelve series: Historical Background, Governance, WID Sponsored Conferences, Projects and Publications, Aging and Disability Project, HIV/AIDS and Disability Project, Domestic and International Policy, Health Care Issues, International, Personal Assistance Services, Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Public Policy in Independent Living and Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Independent Living and Disability Policy, and Technology Policy.

Personnel contains the personnel policies and handbooks for WID, and Publicity contains brochures and other printed materials used for promotion and publicity.

Scope and Contents

This series consists mainly of records generated by Judith Heumann in her capacity as the Director of Domestic and International Policy. After Heumann left WID in the early 1990s, the functions of domestic policy were divided among many different units within WID, and International Policy became a division unto itself. The records reflect Heumann's interest in many different areas of domestic and international disability policy and her involvement in many different issues and organizations worldwide. They include materials on the Americans with Disabilities Act, correspondence, information regarding meetings and conferences attended and information on a variety of domestic and international organizations with which WID collaborated on policy matters or consulted on different issues.

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HEALTH CARE ISSUES, SERIES 8: 1988-1993

Scope and Contents

This series contains project and subject files on the subject of health care. It is especially illustrative of the needs of disabled persons in this important area of public policy. It includes newsletters, testimony before Congress, and project and subject files that consist of reports, grant applications and correspondence.

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Arranged hierarchically and chronologically.

Scope and Contents

This series is further divided into three subseries: International Disability Exchanges and Studies (IDEAS) Project, Russia, and Miscellaneous International Projects. IDEAS is further divided into three sub sub series: Reports, Publications and Research and IDEAS 2000. IDEAS reports are called "Portfolios" and consist primarily of an annual selection of fellowship reports funded by the IDEAS Project. Publications include formal publications relating mainly to disability issues internationally. IDEAS 2000 was a joint project of a consortium of five organizations: Mobility International USA, Rehabilitation International, The Independent Living Research Utilization Program of the Institute for Rehabilitation and Research, The Wheeled Mobility Center and WID. Its aim was to carry out international activities and research that significantly expand the knowledge base in key areas of technology, employment, women's issues and independent living. The project was funded for 60 months. Records from IDEAS 2000 include the grant application for the project, reports and meeting minutes.

The subseries Russia includes information on collaborations with Russian organizations for the disabled, a project conducted in Russia with the All Russian Society for the Disabled, and Deborah Kaplan's report on her trip to Russia.

Miscellaneous International Projects includes information on projects conducted in the Netherlands and in Mexico.

Scope and Contents

This series is further divided into six subseries: Administration, Meetings and Conferences, Projects and Publications, Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on PAS (RRTC-PAS), Staff Writings and Publications, and Subject and Correspondence Files. Administration contains the administrative records of the unit including correspondence, division reports and meeting records. Meetings and Conferences includes materials on meetings organized or sponsored by WID or attended by WID staff. Materials include agendas, minutes, reports, conference papers and correspondence. Projects and Publications includes materials regarding the research and grant funded projects supervised by the Personal Assistance Services division of WID and by the RRTC-PAS. Projects and Publications material is arranged chronologically. Documents include reports and publications, surveys and research notes, grant applications and correspondence. Materials in the RRTC-PAS subseries are mainly administrative and include grant applications, reports, subject and correspondence files and are arranged alphabetically. Staff Writings and Publications may include articles written by individuals before they began working for WID. It is arranged alphabetically by the name of the author. Subject and Correspondence Files are arranged alphabetically by subject matter and include correspondence and background materials relating to organizations, issues and policy matters in personal assistance services. They also include information on Simi Litvak's service on President Clinton's Health Care Task Force.

Scope and Contents

This series is further subdivided into two subseries: Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Public Policy in Independent Living (RRTC-PPIL) and Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Independent Living and Disability Policy (RRTC-ILDP). The RRTC-ILDP is a continuation of the RRTC-PPIL. In 1995 WID was awarded a new grant by the National Institute for Disability Research and Rehabilitation, but changed the name of the center. There is some overlap between the projects of the two centers, but wherever possible they have been separated.

Records of the RRTC-PPIL are arranged into two subseries: Administration and Projects and Publications and Research. Administration contains the administrative records of the unit including correspondence, division reports and meeting records, arranged alphabetically. Projects, Publications and Research is arranged chronologically and then alphabetically by the title of the project or publication. Documents include reports and publications, surveys and research notes, grant applications and correspondence.

Records of the RRTC-ILDP are arranged into three subseries: Administration, Projects, Publications and Research and University of California, Berkeley Disability Studies. Administration contains the administrative records of the unit including correspondence, division reports and meeting records, arranged alphabetically. Projects, Publications and Research is arranged chronologically and then alphabetically by the title of the project or publication. Documents include reports and publications, surveys and research notes, grant applications and correspondence. University of California, Berkeley Disability Studies are arranged chronologically and illustrate the involvement of staff at WID in the development of Disability Studies courses at UC Berkeley and their role as teachers in classes taught in the program. The RRTC-ILDP was also involved in the establishment of the Ed Roberts Graduate and Post-graduate Fellowships at UC Berkeley.

Scope and Contents

This series is further subdivided into five subseries: Administration, Telecommunications, WID Net, Technology Projects and Publications, and Subject and Correspondence Files.

Administration contains the administrative records of the unit including correspondence, newsletters, planning records and meeting records, arranged alphabetically.

Telecommunications is the largest subseries and was an important focus of the Technology Policy Division. It has been arranged into three sub subseries: Blue Ribbon Panel Project (BRP), Projects and Subject and Correspondence Files. The Blue Ribbon Panel was a group of telecommunications industry leaders convened by WID to create a public policy agenda that would give people with disabilities access to the information age. The BRP conducted regional trainings all over the United States from the years 1992-1995. BRP records include reports, correspondence, administrative records, publications and materials regarding the regional training sessions, such as agendas and transcripts. The records are arranged alphabetically.

Projects are research and publications specifically on the subject of telecommunications. These records include grant applications, reports, research and publications and are arranged chronologically. Subject and Correspondence files include information regarding advocacy by WID on national and local policy and legislation in the area of telecommunications. WID was active in lobbying for legislation and pursuing litigation to improve telecommunications access for the disabled. Materials include correspondence, legal documents and reports.

WIDNet was a unique international electronic communications system that focused on disability policy. Materials relating to WIDNet include brochures and publications, administrative materials, meeting records and correspondence, arranged in alphabetical order.

Technology Projects and Publications includes materials on research and other projects on the subject of assistive technology. There is some overlap between this subseries and Telecommunications Projects, but the projects documented in this subseries cover a broader range of technology subjects, including universal design and the information infrastructure. Subject and Correspondence Files cover a broad range of public policy issues and national organizations and include correspondence, publications and information on different industries and advocacy groups. They are arranged alphabetically by subject.
